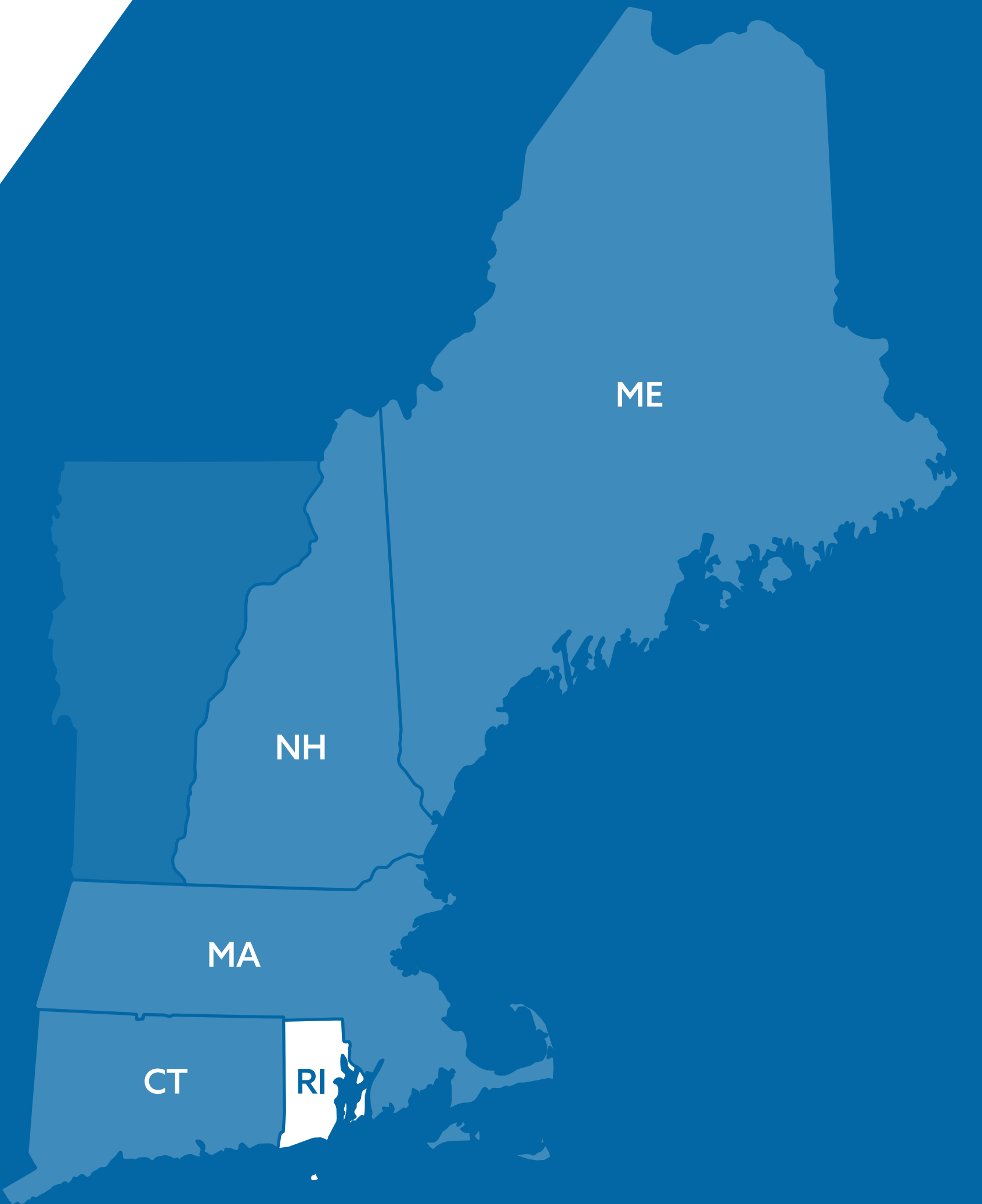

Employee support for Rhode Island nonprofits also includes:

- **Additional match program resources (\$112K+) to national organizations** that allocate funds to nonprofits in the states where we do business.
- **250 volunteer hours, valued at \$9K+**, with Rhode Island nonprofits.
- **More than \$2.1M since 2012 to the Alzheimer's Association** from our Walk to End Alzheimer's team; our total fundraising places us among the **top 20 teams in the country**.

Building healthier communities

Our Foundation works with the community to support, advocate and advance healthier lives for everyone. These are some of the community organizations in Rhode Island that received grants from our Foundation.

The [Rhode Island Healthy Aging Data Report](#), released in 2025, reveals community strengths and challenges to inform targeted interventions across the state. The report, produced by UMass Boston Gerontology Institute researchers, was funded by Point32Health Foundation and engaged key stakeholders to contextualize findings.

- **Age-Friendly Rhode Island** to support a statewide coalition leading the age-friendly movement.
- **Alliance for Nonprofit Impact** to advance community building.
- **Nonviolence Institute**, a Providence organization rooted in the teachings of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., providing street outreach, violence interruption, victim support and youth mentorship to build safer communities.
- **Real Access Motivates Progress (RAMP)** to advance mobility, accessibility and inclusion for people with disabilities through advocacy, education and systems change.
- **The Rhode Island Coalition to End Homelessness** to collaborate with advocates, providers and faith-based organizations to advance solutions that prevent and end homelessness, including increased access to permanent supportive housing for older Rhode Islanders.
